The public hearing for the FY 2022 Budget adoption was held on Wednesday, August 18, 2021, beginning at 7:00 PM at the Lower Platte South NRD Office in Lincoln. Legal notice of the hearing was published on August 9, 2021 in the Lincoln Journal Star newspaper, a copy of the affidavit of publication will be attached to the file copy of the record of the hearing.

Public in attendance included Jack Russell representing LIBA (Lincoln Independent Business Association) in Lincoln and Cory Schmidt of NRCS. Directors present at the hearings included Bob Andersen, Susan Seacrest, Lisa Lewis, Deborah Eagan, Tom Green, Don Jacobson, Larry Ruth, Vern Barrett, Ray Stevens, and Gary Aldridge. Staff present included Kristin Buntemeyer, Mike Mascoe, Dave Potter, and myself.

Treasurer Andersen called the hearing to order at 7:00 pm. He explained that this hearing was for the purpose of receiving testimony on the proposed budget of expenditures for FY 2022. Andersen noted that there are copies of the budget available, the legal notice for this hearing was published on August 9<sup>th</sup> in the Lincoln Journal Star, and he turned it over to myself to review a budget summary. A copy of the budget summary presentation is also attached.

Andersen asked if there were any public comments on the budget. Jack Russell of LIBA addressed those in attendance and attached is a copy of his comments. Andersen reported that Dan Steinkruger of Lincoln was unable to attend but submitted written comments, a copy of those comments are also attached. Gary Aldridge then read his comments into the record, a copy of Aldridge's comments is available upon request. There were no further comments.

#### Good Afternoon Everyone,

I had hoped to attend the budget hearing and provide comments but my schedule does not permit me to do so. I would like to submit my comments in this email and ask that you share them with the appropriate members of the Finance Subcommittee and Board.

I support the budget and am very comfortable with the direction the District is taking. I would like the Board to consider two areas for stronger emphasis in future years program activities and funding.

First, I would ask that the District continue and strengthen programs to accelerate tree planting on public and private property. This includes rural areas and urban areas. Specifically, in Urban areas we continue to see the loss of Ash trees and other species. I expect this will accelerate as the years pass. It is important that we maintain and increase the urban forest canopy to mitigate heat reflection from buildings, concrete and other surfaces in our towns and cities. As minor as it is, programs that increase tree planting will be a contribution/solution to the global warming problem we are facing. The District allocates around one million dollars per year for soil conservation and water quality practices on private lands. I believe the district could focus more programs and funding for forestry given the public benefits.

The other issue is the Salt Creek Resiliency Study. I am pleased to see the the District moving forward and providing \$700,000 for implementation of recommendations from the Study. As climate change and development continues, Lancaster County and Lincoln will face additional flood threats. A key success of the LPSNRD over the years has been in identifying and implementing structural flood control measures. The Salt Creek Resiliency Study, pages 97-100 discusses 16 potential food control dams that could be placed above Lincoln to further reduce flood flows during peak storm events. I believe the District should consider the recommendations and develop a strategy to identify and build additional structures. Moving forward with this type of strategy will be challenging but by doing so the District can seek voluntary land purchases and consider other opportunities to minimize the impacts of dam construction. I would use the Patio NRD strategies of structural flood control as an example of how the LPSNRD might move forward.

We, the current citizens of Lincoln benefit from the decisions made by the NRD Boards(and their predecessors) in the 1960s, 1970s and 1980s to build the levee system and flood control structures that now protect Lincoln. Future generations will benefit from the difficult decisions the Board makes now and in future years as we respond to the potential threats identified in the Salt Creek Resiliency Study.

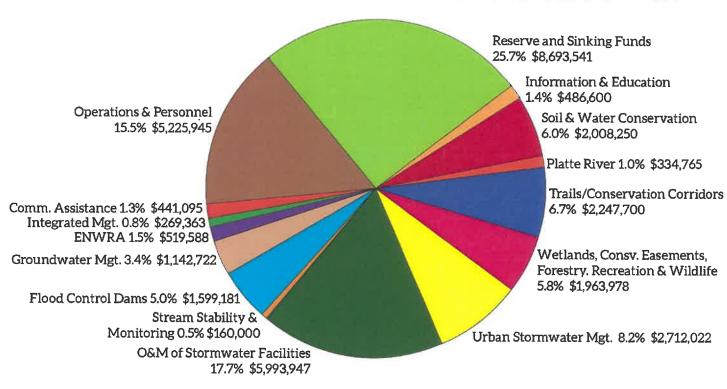

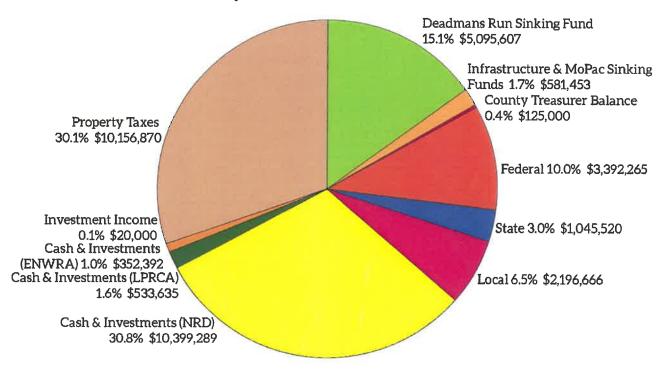
